Student Engagement May Be Education's Most Important Metric

Are students truly engaged in their learning?

For decades, academic success has largely been measured through standardized testing, GPA, and graduation rates. While these benchmarks remain important indicators of educational progress, they no longer tell the full story of whether students are prepared to succeed in a rapidly changing world.

Today's students are entering a future shaped by technological advancement, evolving workforce demands, and increasing economic uncertainty. In response, leaders in the education space are beginning to ask a broader question:

ARE STUDENTS TRULY ENGAGED IN THEIR LEARNING?

Student engagement encompasses far more than academic performance alone. It reflects whether students feel connected to learning, understand the relevance of their education, and develop the confidence and skills needed for life beyond the classroom.

A student can be present in school without being engaged in learning. They can complete assignments without understanding how their education connects to their future. And in a rapidly changing economy, that disconnect carries significant consequences.

As another school year begins, perhaps the most important question isn't whether students are showing up; it's whether they are engaged.

THE CHALLENGE

Students Are Disconnecting

Across the country, student engagement remains a growing concern. While schools have made progress since the pandemic, chronic absenteeism rates remain significantly higher than pre-pandemic levels, with nearly one in four students considered chronically absent, missing at least 10% of the school year.

HOWEVER, DISENGAGEMENT GOES BEYOND ATTENDANCE.

Research from Gallup has found that student engagement declines steadily as students' progress through school, dropping from roughly three-quarters of elementary students to about one-third of high school students. Many students report struggling to see the relevance of what they are learning or how it connects to their future goals.

When students cannot answer the question, "Why does this matter?" Motivation often declines.

THE IMPERATIVE

Why Engagement Matters

Student engagement is more than improving classroom experiences. It is closely linked to academic achievement, workforce readiness, and long-term economic mobility.

Engaged students are more likely to perform well academically, graduate, and feel optimistic about their future. They are also more likely to develop the transferable skills employers increasingly value, including communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and adaptability. When students can connect learning to real-world opportunities, they begin to see a future for themselves beyond the classroom.

They develop a sense of agency, purpose, and possibility that helps them persist through challenges and pursue ambitious goals.

In Gallup research spanning more than 100,000 students, engagement and hope were found to be closely linked to academic achievement and postsecondary readiness outcomes. Students who feel connected to their learning are significantly more likely to believe they have a future worth working toward.

The impact is even more pronounced when students experience real-world learning. Students who participate in career-connected learning are 16 times more likely to feel prepared for life after graduation compared to peers who do not have those experiences.

THE ANSWER

Experiential and Career-Connected Learning

Experiential learning is one of the most effective approaches. When students apply classroom concepts to real-world situations, learning becomes more tangible, memorable, and valuable.

If we know relevance drives engagement, schools must create opportunities for students to experience learning in meaningful ways.
